EYFS

The EYFS framework is structured very differently to the national curriculum as it is organized into seven areas of learning rather than into discrete subjects.

The EYFS Development Matters document was published in 2012 by Early Education with support from the DfE and later revised. It is nonstatutory guidance designed to give Early Years practitioners detailed information about how and when children develop key knowledge, skills and concepts. It reinforces our understanding that to develop learning *for* history (as distinct from the learning *of* history) you need to look across and beyond the teaching of discrete subjects. The framework can thus be a useful starting point when developing and monitoring provision in Nursery and Reception classes. Most importantly, it reminds us that good Early Years practice is based upon an integrated, child-centred curriculum.
