
I am different, I am me

BIG Question

Is it good to be different?

Welcome back to school and welcome to our new 6 families joining our Sacred Heart community. I hope you had an enjoyable break. I am so excited to begin a brand new year with you all — we have some fantastic learning opportunities planned for the year ahead.

This half term, our big question is 'What is it like to be different?' The children will become immersed in the story of Elmer the Patchwork Elephant where they will be introduced to the concept of being different. They will develop their independence and self-care through carefully planned activities and develop a sense of their own identity by talking about themselves, their families and their interests. They will develop their understanding that we are all unique and loved by our families, friends and God and be respectful of the differences of others. By the end of the project the children will have developed an understanding of themselves as an individual.

Key Messages

- Please ensure that your child brings their schoolbook bag each day.

- Our PE session is a Wednesday morning, your child will need a PE kit in school, which is kept in school and returned for washing at the end of each half term.
- All weekly updates and communication will be sent through Class Dojo, it is crucial that you check this platform regularly to receive up to date information.
- As we learn new faces, please be patient with members of staff at the end of the school day. Our priority is to ensure that children are safely dismissed. It won't take us long to remember you all we promise!
